


Return to the Community

While the pandemic allowed us to innovate and find new ways to connect with immigrants, in 2022 we were glad to be able to reconnect with our community in the best way possible: in person. CARECEN met with immigrants in our offices and other safe spaces across Long Island to provide them vital services in a way that allowed for human connection and strengthened our bonds with the communities we serve.

Engaging New Communities

In 2022, we developed new programs to respond to the needs of immigrant communities that we had not previously served. We helped Venezuelans fleeing hardship who wished to make their homes on Long Island apply for permission to enter the United States. We launched a new program to help Afghans seeking refuge obtain safety through legal status. As our services expanded so did the countries that our clients come from.

In 2022, CARECEN also engaged the community of English language learners on Long Island. Through our new ESOL program, CARECEN empowered new Americans through adult English language classes, helping them learn the language skills they need to thrive in their new communities on Long Island.

Creating Community

CARECEN is dedicated to making Long Island a place where immigrants are able to put down roots and contribute to the long-term growth of our region. The realization of this mission is reflected in our staff and volunteers, more than 50% of which previously received services through CARECEN. The support they received from CARECEN made it possible for them to continue building power in our immigrant communities as part of the CARECEN team. They are a testament to the value of welcoming immigrants because their contributions will benefit Long Island for generations to come.


Creating Community


